Dr. Todd Boyd Mad Men (CTCS 469) Wednesdays 1:00-5:50, SCA 108 Spring 2014 (Draft Syllabus)

This course is interested in studying the popular, critically acclaimed television program Mad Man (2007-present). From its inception this program was noted for, among other things, a sophisticated, though specific historical representation of the activities centered in a Madison Avenue advertising agency of the 1960s. Using the characters, themes, and overall milieu of the program, the course will engage a number of films and books from the 1950s/60s that influenced Mad Men, as well as other texts that are directly referenced in the program. In focusing on *Mad Men* and history the course will use the program to analyze the larger social, political, and cultural issues that defined Cold War America at mid-century. The historical figures, events, and issues in question—the 1960 JFK/Nixon presidential election and the JFK assassination, the Civil Rights movement, Marilyn Monroe, Muhammad Ali, Vietnam, among other examples—will assist in providing a context for understanding and appreciating both what is represented within *Mad Men*, as well as what is excluded from this representation. The course will endeavor to unpack several of the numerous references "sampled" in Mad Men, as well as those cultural references inspired by the program. The unpacking of these references will take place as the course explores the nostalgia inherent to a contemporary cultural style that foregrounds themes such as retro and vintage in its representation. Finally, the course is interested in using the success of *Mad Men* to discuss the altered landscaped of television in the digital era.
