ECON 303 Intermediate Microeconomics TTH, 2:00 – 3:50 KAP 156

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Microeconomic is foundation to all other economic theory. This course focuses on the following topics: Consumer choice theory, Production function and profit maximization, demand and supply, competitive market, monopoly, models of oligopoly, externalities and public goods and game theory. At the end, you will have tools to analyze a variety of economic problems.

Learning Objectives

- Explain consumer choice theory and optimal bundle graphically as well as mathematically
- Explain income effect and substitution effect graphically and calculate each effect mathematically given the required information.
- Derive individual and aggregate demand functions.
- Explain producer theory graphically; find the optimal quantity of production, and optimal combination of input mathematically.
- Derive producer supply functions.
- Explain perfectly competitive markets and its implications for consumers, producers and aggregate economic welfare.
- Explain Monopoly and its implications for producers, consumers and aggregate economic welfare.
- Explain different types of market failures and its implications on aggregate economic welfare and the role of the government.
- Explain equilibrium in imperfectly competitive markets, its implications for producers, consumers and aggregate economic welfare.
- Explain and derive strategy profile for each player, explain domination, iterative domination and Best response function, mixed strategy profile and pure strategy and mixed strategy Nash equilibrium.
