# **Course Description**

Purpose of the course: To write and complete the first half (or more) of an original screenplay. Each participant will develop an original idea from inception through completion. The first half of the course will focus on preparing the idea: structure, character, scene execution will be discussed and developed through written coursework that will be assigned each week and turned in at the beginning of the next session. After the preparation material is complete, we write ten pages per week, starting with the first ten pages, followed by the second ten pages, then the Plot Point at the end of Act I and through Act II. Student pages will be read and analyzed in class. The goal of this course is to write and complete the first 45 – 60 pages of an original screenplay. Movies will be assigned each week to be viewed and short essays written focusing on specific aspects of the film, ranging from critical, structural and character perspectives.
