## Theories of Gender & Sexuality

This graduate seminar surveys theoretical writing about gender and sexuality, with an emphasis on those theories that have been influential in cinema and media studies. We will engage with media texts insofar as they might nuance or inform our ongoing theoretical engagements with gender and sexuality. Though our interests within the areas of gender and sexuality will be broad, we will read mostly relevant and influential scholarship produced within the areas of feminist and women's studies; queer theory; lesbian, gay, and transgender studies; cultural studies; psychoanalysis; critical theory; and cinema and media studies.
