DESCRIPTION



This course focuses on a the intellectual and artistic energy of a pioneering generation of French-speaking black poets and thinkers from the Caribbean and Africa, spanning from the height of French imperialism between the Great Wars to the waves of imperial decolonization under various forms. Negritude writers forged new poetic voices to articulate the meaning and experience of blackness in their time, all while delivering foundational critiques of race, imperialism, and colonial culture relevant for us today. Today contemporary scholars are reconsidering their many different ideas about the meaning of blackness, the relationship between politics and culture, the role of the poet, and the definition of freedom (to name just a few key questions). As they built historic transnational solidarities devoted to tackling the "black problem," they engaged in heated debates about the basis of those solidarities and the right way black people in the world could advance towards a better future. This course investigates key debates in the negritude movement put forth in poems and essays by Aimé Césaire, Léon Gontran Damas, Léopold Sédar Senghor, René Depestre, Guy Tirolien, and others, and discusses their legacy for us today. This course will be conducted <u>entirely</u> in French.

READINGS

The readings consist of poems, essays, and secondary scholarship on the history of black radical poetry. There are four texts required for purchase at the bookstore: three books of poetry and one reader consisting of poetry and critical essays. **All primary texts are in French, many have not been translated.**
