Course Description:

Introduction to the fundamental concepts and interactions of the biology and mechanics of the human body. Analysis of the tissues and structures that comprise the major organ systems of the body as well as the functional implications of these structural relationships.

VI. Additional Policies

- A midterm exam can be taken after the specified date **ONLY** if the student has a **documented** medical excuse.
