Grading scheme

Your final percentage will be determined by the following formula:

- 10% Homework
- 15% Quizzes
- 40% Midterm Exams (20% each)

Approximate grade ranges: A \geq 90%, B 80-89%, C 70-79%, D 60-69%, with pluses and minuses given appropriately. The cutoffs may be adjusted lower to reflect the class curve, but e.g. 90% will guarantee at least an A-.

Homework and Quizzes

Homework will be assigned weekly, normally due in lecture on Friday. Late homework will not be accepted. The lowest two homework scores will be dropped.

Except for the first week, and exam weeks, there will be quizzes in your Thursday discussion sections, related to the current homework assignment. Make-up quizzes will not be offered. The lowest two quiz scores will be dropped.
