Database Web Development ITP 300 (3 Units)



Objective

Students will learn how to build dynamic, database-driven web sites. The course will teach how to structure website content in databases, how to retrieve and manipulate data to display on website.

Concepts

Students will learn the basics of relational database management systems (RDBMS). They will learn how to design and implement MySQL databases using MySQL Workbench and other MySQL database platforms. Students will then learn Structured Query Language (SQL) and PHP scripting language to integrate database calls into dynamic web pages.

Prerequisites ITP 301 or intermediate knowledge of HTML, CSS, and JavaScript.
