Course Description

This course seeks to develop an understanding of the fundamental principles of law that affect virtually every professional engaged in the delivery, organization, or coverage of health care. The course will consist of lectures, readings, presentations, and discussions. Class discussions will be based on required readings and lectures.

Learning Objectives

Upon completing this course, the student will be able to:

- Gain appreciation for, and comfort with, the unsettled and dynamic nature of health law.
- Develop basic skills to analyze a health related contract from a legal perspective.
- Develop executive level skills to identify and deal with legal issues in health care.
- Develop an in-depth, working knowledge of one significant area of health law that applies to your current or intended responsibilities or interests.

Prerequisite(s): PPD 509 or substantial prior work experience in health care organizations. Open only to graduate students.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Class Preparation and Participation

It is expected that all students will actively participate in class discussions. Students are expected to read and analyze materials assigned in advance of each class and be prepared to discuss them. Students will be evaluated on their ability to identify and discuss legal problems and their relationship to health care management, delivery and policy.

Weekly Contact / Reflections

All Students are required to complete weekly reflections on course materials based on prompts that the instructor will provide online through Blackboard. Prompts will be posted on Monday, and the assignment is due Sunday of that week.

Weekend 1 Exam

In-class, closed-book, multiple choice examination that will test the understanding of the material presented in weekend 1. All questions are based on the readings, lecture, and discussion.

Weekend 2 Exam

In-class, closed-book, multiple choice examination that will test the understanding of the material presented in weekend 2. All questions are based on the readings, lecture, and discussion.

Final Summative Experience

This is a <u>brief</u> final essay (no more than three pages single spaced) on a topic that the instructor will share with you.
