

CSLC 600 Professional Development I: Publication

This two-unit course is designed to inform you about scholarly publication: how to prepare an article or a book manuscript for submission, how to choose a journal or a press, and the editorial process from consideration of a manuscript until final publication. The course meets in two-hour sessions every other week. By the end of the course, you are expected to produce the manuscript of an article ready for submission to a journal. You will work on this project throughout the semester.

The course can be taken only on a credit/no-credit basis. You should plan to attend all meetings, which will be held roughly every two weeks, participate actively in the discussions, and complete all assignments in advance of each meeting. You will not pass the course if you miss meetings without an academically convincing reason or if you do not produce the final project when it is due.

- **Assignment**: Pre-circulate an essay you'd like to revise into a journal article. Review your bibliography.

January 28: Selecting a journal

- **Reading:** Belcher, Weeks 4-5; Booth, Ch. 1-4
- Assignment: Think about which journals you want to publish in. Begin to list revisions you plan to make.

February 11: Submission, review, acceptance, revision of journal articles

- **Reading:** Belcher, Weeks 6-7; Booth, Ch. 7
- Assignment: Pre-circulate abstract of the article you will present at the end of the semester. Be prepared to discuss the revisions you are working on.

February 25: Workshop 1
