Course Description

This course further explores the practice of bringing clowns into places of healing (hospitals, trauma sites, etc.) for the purpose of improving the physical and mental well-being of those in need. Through observation of Medical Clowns engaging with patients, and subsequently, practicum in the hospital, students will be able to utilize the skills they have acquired and learn through immersion. This course would be appropriate for artists who want to put their medical clowning studies to practice.

Learning Objectives

- To observe and assess the impact of clowns in the hospital.
- To acclimate to the new and unique performing environment of a hospital.
- To develop and apply clown principles to the practice of medical clowning.
- To assess one's own impact when intervening in various healing settings.
- To gather observations and experiences into a journal prefaced by a clear and comprehensive preamble.

Prerequisite(s): THTR 290 Introduction to Medical Clowning

Description and Assessment of Assignments

For every shift to the hospital, there will be a shift report due. It will be a one page reflection of your experience highlighting interactions that stood out, what worked and what didn't, and lessons learned. The instructor will create a google folder specifically for each student to submit their weekly reports

At the end of the semester, a preamble to the journal of shift reports will be due. This will compile all the main ideas and experiences from the semester into one 3-4 page document. This will also be dropped into the google folder.

Course Schedule:

Aside from the weeks where we meet on campus, each student will have a weekly three hour session at Los Angeles County Hospital. There will be three phases, each phase lasting approximately five weeks:

Phase 1 – Observation: The students observe Raquel Gendry and Zach Steel practicing Medical Clowning in the hospital.

Phase 2 – Guided Practice: The students are paired with either Raquel or Zach and they will practice together.

Phase 3 – Independent Practicum: Under the observation of Zach, the students will be paired with each other and discover and develop their own practice.

At least once in between each phase, and as needed, we will meet on campus and work on the craft in the studio classroom. Those weeks where we meet on campus, we will not be going to the hospital.

SDA PRODUCTIONS
