#### **BISC 305: Statistics for the Biological Sciences**

**Course Content:** Statistics for the Biological Sciences is an introductory course in statistics addressed to students in the life sciences. The learning objective is to illustrate statistical reasoning in biological science and medicine. The students will learn probability models, experimental design, statistical analyses, and interpretation of results. The course uses real data from life sciences.

**Textbook**: *Statistics for the Life Sciences* by M.L. Samuels, J.A. Witmer and A. Schaffner. Prentice Hall, 5th Edition.

**Grading**: There is a Midterm Exam and a Final Exam. There will be homework due every Tuesday and every Thursday. It is important that students do the homework: I believe that students learn the most when working on the homework. The homework will be a combination of problems from the textbook and assignments in R (R is a free computer program for statistics that we will introduce in lecture). A 50% grade deduction will be imposed for late homework, and no homework later than one week will be accepted. In addition, there will be two R projects. There will also be quizzes every Tuesday and every Thursday (there will not be a quiz the first week, and there will not be a quiz on the days when there are exams). The quiz on Tuesday will be on the content covered in the homework due the previous Thursday, and the quiz on Thursday will be on the content covered in the homework due two days earlier.
