I. Learning outcomes

- 1. Develop an appreciation for pedagogical methods.
- 2. Develop the ability to properly apply pedagogical methods.
- 3. Develop the ability to understand teaching technology specific to the sciences at USC.
- 4. Improve skills for communicating ideas, both orally and in writing.

II. Course Description

This is a 2-credit TA training course designed specifically for graduate students in the Molecular and Computational sections of the Department of Biological Sciences, USC Dana and David Dornsife College of Letters, Arts and Sciences. One of the main goals of the course is to help students to become thoughtful and inspiring teachers, encouraging not just their immediate success in the classroom, but their long-term development as teachers. In addition to the basic teaching skills, the course will also focus on specific challenges and strategies in teaching Molecular Biology and Computational Biology. Concurrent registration or prior completion of this course is a condition of being assigned a first Teaching Assistantship in Molecular and Computational Biology.

III. Grading

This course will be taught Credit/No Credit. Each student will be assigned to give more than one presentation (specific number depends on the students enrolled in the class) that will be critiqued by the rest of the class. The instructor will lead and coordinate the critique discussion. At the end of discussion, an evaluation form will be filled out to give the presenter feed back on the strengths and weaknesses of the presentation and suggestions of improvement. Grades will be based on quality of presentation and class participation.
