Designed to either assist with understanding academic research and dialogue or offer experience in honing professional skills, you will receive prompts or instructions for each:

1. Musical scholarship in the age of Black Lives Matter
2. Library “scavenger hunt”
3. Program notes for a performance or liner notes for a recording
4. Grant proposal for a potential arts-related project

Final Project

The goal of the final project is to reflect your understanding of research techniques and music resources, as well as the craft of writing and formatting a quality bibliography. It is also intended to serve as a first step toward possible further research in your academic and/or professional career.

- Agree on a topic with me and identify at least 20 different sources pertinent to the topic
- Using The Chicago Manual of Style, appropriately cite and write an annotation for each source
- Write a 3,000-word (minimum) accompanying essay that:
 - Provides an overview of the topic
 - Summarizes your findings of scholarship on the topic
 - Suggests possibilities for future research

During the last three class meetings, everyone will give a 15-minute summary presentation of their project to the class; accompanying materials such as slides are welcomed, but not required.
