

Corporate Fraud Seminar (Law 867) Spring 2021 W 2-4:50pm

Units: 3. This course satisfies the writing requirement.

Location: Zoom / Rm. 101 **Instructor:** Robert H. Fairbank

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Course Description

This course exposes law students to the "real world issues" of major civil and criminal corporate fraud. Nationally recognized lawyers and judges present weekly case studies of many of the largest and most notorious corporate fraud of the last twenty years. The speakers were (and are) active participants - as prosecutors, public defenders, defense counsel, judges, and plaintiffs' lawyers - in many of the nation's major corporate fraud investigations, lawsuits, and trials. The students, in teams of four, then immerse themselves in a simulated internal investigation of one of seven high-profile corporate fraud case studies. Each student writes an in-depth internal investigation report, and each team of four makes a formal presentation of their investigative findings to the defrauded company's "New Board of Directors" (Professor Fairbank and the rest of the class). The goal of the class is to give each student a very realistic and exhilarating introduction to the factual, legal, ethical, and strategic issues involved in the world of major civil and criminal corporate fraud.

Learning Objectives

- 1. Gain an in depth understanding of "real-world" issues (strategic, factual, ethical, and legal) of major civil and criminal corporate fraud case studies
- 2. Undertake an in-depth written analysis of one of ten major corporate fraud case studies.
- 3. Participate in a formal group presentation of an "internal investigation" of major corporate fraud to a (hypothetical) Board of Directors (the class)
- 4. Acquire an understanding from nationally recognized lawyers and judges of the many diverse and exciting roles in major corporate fraud cases (i.e. judge, prosecutor, public defender, white collar defense counsel, civil plaintiffs, and defense counsel).

Optional Materials

On Blackboard, I will post weekly reading packets with articles describing the speakers and their respective cases. You will not be tested on anything in the readings. Nevertheless, I am hoping that you will spend about three hours a week reading most or all of the suggested materials.

Assignments

1. Group Presentation on Randomly Assigned Topic:

In groups of 4, students will simulate an independent investigation of a major corporate fraud case and present a group investigation report to the class. Presentations will take place the last two weeks of the semester: April 14th, 2021 and April 21st, 2021.

2. <u>Individual Paper</u>

Each student will also write an investigation report of 25-45 pages analyzing the fraud you are presenting on. A final version of the draft will tentatively be due on April 1, 2021 in as complete a form as possible. I will then review all the papers and set up 30 minute one-on-one paper revision sessions with each student. The revised paper will tentatively be due on Friday, April 23rd, 2021.
