Two-Semester Objective

Develop an original hour-long dramatic television series including characters, world, and story lines for Season One; write and polish a pilot episode, a pitch document, and a 10-episode season arc

Second Semester Objective

Write a professional-quality pitch plus a 10-episode season arc. The revised/polished pilot script, the second semester pitch document, and the Thesis packet will be turned in during finals week and will count as the final for this course.

Course Goals

The first semester of this two-semester course was devoted to the creation of a pilot script for a one-hour dramatic television series.

This semester is a giant step forward in bringing the series to fruition. The work that lies ahead is daunting. Students will architect and give a professional-quality pitch of their project. The purpose of this is to dive deeper into the concept, analyze and dimensionalize the characters and discover if the pilot can sustain several seasons. Or do adjustments have to be made in the pilot/show concept to correct any weaknesses that have been uncovered?

In addition, pitching the show will teach the students valuable lessons on how to verbally convey their show idea as if they were pitching it to a producer with the hope of attaching them to the project or a TV executive in hopes of garnering a sale.

Finally, students will revise their pilot script, incorporating notes they received from the Thesis Share Day. All of these elements will be combined into the final package for grading.

Specific Goals:

- Architect and orally deliver a professional-quality pitch
- Evaluate and develop believable, dimensional series characters
- Understand the importance of creating intriguing guest characters, some that reappear over several episodes
- Sketch out episodes of the first season as well as what the tentpoles for the series are
- Rewrite/polish pilot script

Course Schedule

** Please note that all class topics are subject to change at the discretion of the professor**

Week 1 (January 21):

Discussion of Thesis Share Day notes. Discussion of where each student's pilot ended and where the series will now go. The entire season will be discussed with its possibilities and challenges. Review Winter Break assignment. Begin discussion of the concept of pitching – main elements that make up a pitch (Hook, Why Me?, Tone/World, Characters, Pilot Story & Beyond).

Assignment: Begin to write your pitch.

Weeks 2 through 5 (January 28, February 4. 11,18):

Discuss each student's pitch and push deeper into each presentation so that a rough skeleton can begin to take shape.

Assignment: Continue honing/refining pitch document.

<u>Week 6 (February 25</u>): Orally deliver revised/polished pitch.

Assignment: Read pilot script. Prepare list of five things to address in rewrite.

Weeks 7 through 11 (March 4, 11, 18, 25, 1):

Rewrite weeks. Return to the first semester pilot script to adjust the writing to accommodate any notes from Thesis committee, adjustments as a result of the pitch doc, as well as the Season 1 episode arcs. Rewritten scripts in progress are brought to the workshop each week. Scenes are discussed and students are continuously advised.

Assignment: Write/turn-in an act a week so that you have a revised draft finished by the end of week 12 ready for the table read.

Weeks 12 & 13 (April 8, 15): Table reads. Three students per week.

Friday, April 16 – Final Draft of Pilot script due to student's Thesis Committee members

<u>Week 14 (April 22)</u>: No class – Wellness Day

Friday, April 23 – 2nd Thesis Committee Day

Week 15 (April 29):

Apply feedback from table read, discuss any last-minute issues with script, season, bible, etc. Wrapup. Discuss the industry, where to go from here? What's next?

<u>Finals Week</u>: Have everything polished and honed to the best of your ability so that the entire package can be emailed on **Thursday, May 6th by 1 pm**.
