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# I. Course Description

In 1968, the American sprinters Tommie Smith and John Carlos famously raised their fists atop the Olympic podium. They were promptly expelled from the Mexico City Games.

In the years since, the International Olympic Committee enacted what is called Rule 50. It bans the display of "political, religious or racial propaganda" in any Olympic venues, particularly the podium.

On Dec. 10, 2020, in conjunction with International Human Rights Day, the Protests and Demonstrations Steering Committee of the Team USA Council on Racial and Social Justice declared that "denying the right of respectful demonstrations to athletes, particularly those from historically underrepresented and marginalized groups, runs counter to the Olympic and Paralympic values."

The same day, the chief executive of the U.S. Olympic & Paralympic Committee, Sarah Hirshland, released a letter to American athletes that said the organization would not sanction an athlete who took part in a peaceful protest at the Games: "It is critical to state unequivocally that human rights are not political, and peaceful calls for equity and equality must not be confused with divisive demonstrations."

Here is the but - Rule 50 still stands, and the IOC has evidenced little to no intent to change it.

Whatever the USOPC may say, or not, the Americans are but one of 206 nations invited to a Games.

This story – like many others at the intersection of race and social justice – is due to play out over the course of this semester. The Tokyo Games are due to begin July 23.

Sport offers a prism unlike any other into virtually every facet of the world around us: politics, economics, business, culture and more. Indeed, it sometimes allows us an entrée into people, places and things that so-called "hard" news simply can't, or won't, because sport – like music – offers a way for people to communicate that is, or at least, can be universal.

That's what this course is about: writing and reporting about everything and anything in our world through the touchstone of sport.

# II. Overall Learning Objectives and Assessment

- To refine the print and multimedia skill set that sets apart today's working sports journalist
- To begin developing the individual brand that is the key to success in today's ultra-competitive sports journalism marketplace
- To develop a working understanding of what sport is and, simultaneously, what the differing cultures of sport are and why they matter in today's complex world
- To appreciate the history of sport while contemplating its multi-faceted future
- To gain perspective, context and background on a variety of issues in which sport intersects with other areas of society
- To appreciate that while sport is "play" it is simultaneously "work" and "business," too

You will be expected to review the *Los Angeles Times* and *New York Times* sports sections every day, and to watch at least one edition nightly of ESPN's "SportsCenter" or similar highlights show.

You will be expected to use Twitter as a news feed. If you are not on it, we will spend some time during the first class to make sure everyone in class has a Twitter handle. We will spend some time discussing – indeed, emphasizing – the instructor's three suggested guidelines for posting to Twitter.

The idea of reading and watching so much is to become immersed in the culture of sports. As Deion Sanders said in his Pro Football Hall of Fame enshrinement speech, "If your dream ain't bigger than you, there's a problem with your dream."

To that end, you will be expected to launch your own sports-themed blog, and to contribute to it regularly.

You will also be expected over the course of the semester to turn in two lengthier written assignments – or, with the instructor's assent, multimedia projects.

# III. Description of Assignments

#### 1. The blog

You will launch your own sports-themed blog. Whatever free content management system you prefer is fine. You will be expected to contribute to that blog at least once weekly. More often would be preferred. Short items of 250 to 300 words would be ideal. Longer pieces, if the mood or interest strikes, would of course be welcomed.

Launching the blog jump-starts each student's identity in the marketplace – to write, or post videos, or both, on whatever it is that is the thing, or things, of interest to him or her. It could be football. Or *futbol*. It could be statistics or lists or analysis. It could be commentary. The important thing is to be out there.

2. Written or multimedia assignments

In addition to the regular blogging, you will write two (2) assignments of at least 1500 words or produce two (2) multimedia projects. Alternatively, you may produce one (1) written assignment and one (1) multimedia project. The first of the two assignments will be due mid-semester, the second at semester's end.

# c. Grading Standards

- An "A" grade means you have a full grasp of the concept are doing exceptional work. That work is completed on time, and with minimal editing. You exhibit professionalism.
- A "B" or below means you need more extensive editing, miss deadline or don't grasp the concept – or otherwise show in your work or effort that it is not up to the highest professional standards.
- A "C" means you turned the story in, albeit with a minimal amount of effort. The work is done, but requires a fair amount of editing. It is clear you might not have done in-depth reporting or research, and the assignment does not meet professional standards.
- A "D" requires excessive rewriting, features numerous errors and should not have been submitted.

- An "F" fails to meet the major criteria of the assignment, is late, contains numerous errors or both. Your copy should not contain any errors in spelling, style, grammar and facts. Note: <u>any</u> factual error will lead to an <u>automatic F</u>. Why? Accuracy is the first law of journalism. The following are some other circumstances that would warrant a grade of "F" and potential USC/Annenberg disciplinary action:
- Fabricating a story or making up quotes or information.
- Plagiarizing a script/article, part of a script/article or information from any source.
- Staging video or telling interview subjects what to say.
- Using video shot by someone else and presenting it as original work.
- Shooting video in one location and presenting it as another location.
- Using the camcorder to intentionally intimidate, provoke or incite a person or a group of people to elicit more "dramatic" video.
- Promising, paying or giving someone something in exchange for doing an interview either on or off camera.
- Missing a deadline.

# IV. Assignment Submission Policy

- A. Class meets Tuesdays. All assignments are due at 11 p.m. the Sunday prior. Example: for the class that meets Jan. 26, that week's assignment is due 11 p.m. Jan 24.
- B. Lacking prior discussion <u>and</u> agreement with the instructor, late assignments will earn an <u>automatic</u> <u>F</u>. In the real world, late assignments can indeed, will get you fired. Best to learn this lesson in school.
- C. Assignments <u>must</u> be submitted via Blackboard. There are no paper submissions in this course. It is entirely electronic.
- D. Assignments <u>must</u> be submitted in Microsoft Word. No other application will do. If you file in Text format, or Pages, or some other word processing application, it will result in an <u>automatic F</u>.

Jackie Robinson broke the color barrier in baseball in 1947. Now, when it comes to basketball, the riff is so commonly accepted that it was made into a movie title: "White Men Can't Jump."

Now there's an NBA team in Oklahoma City. Oklahoma City!? The NFL plays a number of regular-season games in London; odds are there will be a team based there within 10 years. The season that wrapped up with the Lakers winning the NBA title in a COVID-19 bubble in Orlando started with a crisis with the Lakers in China triggered by a comment made by the Houston Rockets general manager over democracy in Hong Kong.

After 20 years away, the NFL during its 2016 season made its return to Los Angeles. The Rams made the Super Bowl. Now there's a brand-new stadium – that has yet to see a paying fan.

#### Week Seven – March 2

An examination of the role of women in the American sports landscape.

It is now nearly 50 years since the passage of Title IX, the 1972 federal law that bans sex discrimination in schools, whether in the classroom or the playing field. Perhaps no law has done more to re-shape the sports landscape in the United States. Query: is it still vital?

Going back to the 530-member team that the U.S. Olympic Committee sent to London for the 2012 Games: it consisted of 268 women and 261 men – a direct consequence of the years of influence of Title IX. The 554-member 2016 Rio team? Female: 292. Moreover, women won 50.4 percent of Team USA's Rio medals, men 46.3 percent (close readers: mixed events accounted for 3.3 percent).

So why – outside of basketball games in college-town hotbeds such as Knoxville, Tenn., or Storrs, Conn. – don't women's sports draw?
