Course Description

The purpose of this 15-week course is to enable a basic level of drumming competency, laying a foundation upon which students can increase their understanding of rhythm, promote a mastery of physical and musical coordination, and establish a set of skills on the drumset. Students will also learn how to communicate their musical wishes to drummers they might work with in the future, both verbally as well as by way of musical notation.

The unprecedented and ongoing COVID-19 pandemic means that students will not be able to utilize the drumsets in the Drum Lab for classroom or practicing purposes. This necessitates an adaptation and rewriting of the syllabus for the course. GOOD NEWS: THIS IS WHAT DRUMMERS DO ... we adapt! So, the goal of this course will be to focus on the role of the drums in modern American music, also known as Black American music. The course will continue to instruct students on basic drumming techniques. Every student is required to get themselves a PRACTICE PAD and a good pair of sticks before Week #2 of class. If you have a drumset to practice on, then great! If not, we will accomplish a lot by way of the practice pad (with sticks) AND body drumming (playing on your thighs with your hands). All of that said, there will be a bit more listening and watching compared to learning how to play beats on an electronic drumset ... so, it will be a bit like teaching you how to ride a bicycle without the bicycle: you'll have all of the theory, but it might take a second to get your balance once you're on wheels.

<u>Please note!</u> Professor Erskine is the Instructor of Record only for this course.

The day-to-day / class-to-class instruction will be done by TAs Luke Woodle or Lauren Ellis. Professor Erskine will supply additional instruction by way of audio and video links and emails. Professor Erskine may be reached by email in place of inoffice meetings. Students will be notified in advance of any masterclass presentations hosted by Professor Erskine.

Students will gain:

- The ability to perform basic drumming rudiments with drumsticks on a practice pad
- The ability to perform a variety of basic drumming styles, patterns and beats
- The ability to play the drums in an ensemble context, i.e., with other musicians
- An understanding of the role and development of the drumset in contemporary music

Grading Criteria:

- Attendance and Participation (16%): Attendance is expected at all classes and is mandatory for exams. Classes which
 meet once per week can allow one unexcused absence per semester. Each additional unexcused absence will result in
 a 4% reduction in overall mark. Classes which meet twice a week can allow two unexcused absences per semester.
 Each additional unexcused absence will result in a 2% reduction in overall mark. Please be on time and participate in
 class!
- Listening Assignment (10%): Students will be emailed a small set of music samples by Week 5 of the semester. Listen to the music provided and compose a journal-style response between 500-1,000 words. The assignment is due, via email, to Professor Erskine and your respective TA by the end of Week 10. More details about the Listening Assignment will be discussed by your TA in class.
- Mid-term Exam (34%): A) Written exam testing drumming styles, players and history presented in class. B) Playing
 exam testing basic drumming skills on the practice pad as well as drumset skills that have been learned in class.
- **Final Exam (40%)** Students will perform in a jury-type setting for the Instructor. They may be asked to play basic drum rudiments, as well as any of the styles or tempos that have been studied throughout the semester. Drumset chart reading may also be part of the final examination.
- Compulsory Video Viewing (outside of class), plus 1 group lecture: Students will be provided with an internet
 website address for the viewing of four video lessons (total viewing time approximately 30 minutes) during the first
 weeks of the semester. In addition, Professor Erskine may present an on-line (zoom) masterclass; advance notice will
 be given, attendance +/or viewing will be mandatory.

Netiquette Considerations

"Netiquette" or "internet etiquette," describes the recommended communication and behavior of online communication. Students are expected to be dressed appropriately for class. Class time is not snack time. You'll do your best work by approaching the course as if you were taking it in-person/on-campus. Simply put: the study of music is, in great measure, the study of being professional.
