Course Description

Welcome to Camera & Improv! This course provides an introduction to the basics of being in front of the camera as well as behind the camera. Learn the skills and terminology behind the camera to become more efficient when putting your projects together. Expect to be putting films together as well as improvising for the camera. Become proficient in iMovie and recognize the basics of storytelling.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Apply basic concepts and tools of filmmaking.
2. Create your own film content from beginning to end.
3. Develop a comfortable presence in front of the camera.

Prerequisite(s): [THTR 220A](#) or [THTR 252A](#)

Co-Requisite(s): None

Recommended Preparation: getting familiar with iMovie.

Description and Assessment of Assignments

Selfie Story

Students will film themselves selfie style, telling a comedic or dramatic story. It should be 45 seconds to a minute. No cuts, one take.

Buster Keaton project.

Students will make a silent film black and white, one minute long. Tell a story using physical gestures and a prop. The story should have a beginning middle and end.

Recreate a scene: Students will find a scene from a movie or a tv show and bring it in to class. We will analyze the equipment and tools used for the production. Then we will reproduce The scene using the tools and equipment available to us.

Action sequence.

Students will write an action sequence of one to two minutes long. They will shoot, edit and add music. The students have the choice to be in front or behind the camera, or both, for this project.

Editing project.

Students will gather footage and pictures of themselves and edit a one minute and a half story with narration.

2 Page scene.

Students will write a two page scene. They will then shoot the project and edit it into a final piece. Students have the choice to be in front or behind the camera, or both, for this project.

Monologue project.

Students will write a monologue for themselves. The monologues will be shot and edited and presented in class. The monologue should be about a minute long. The students have to be in front of the camera for this one.

- Critique work, not people
- Support critique with evidence, or speak from personal experience
- Allow everyone to critique (i.e., don't dominate or remain silent)
- Keep a positive tone when offering critique and responding to it
- Accept critique in the positive spirit with which it is given as a means of development
