Course Description

A survey of the influence of historical and cultural events, architectural, artistic, fashion, literary, musical and theatrical styles in reference to theatrical use. Mid/Late Baroque Era up to Modern Day

Learning Objectives

Recall, organize and identify information about key time periods and architectural, cultural, artistic, literary and fashion styles from early man up until the Renaissance.

Assemble research projects highlighting specific Architectural, Artistic and Fashion related Styles from specific key time periods

Description and Assessment of Assignments

We will be work week to week on different chronological time periods starting in 1650AD (the Mid / Late Baroque) up to present day. There are Four research based assignments

given (see below) during the semester. All assignments will be submitted via e-mail to: tbuderwi@usc.edu. Formats for assignment submissions will be included with each assignment upon instruction and will vary depending on assignment type.

- 1) Vermeer Painting Project: Study and analyze two Vermeer paintings. Provide specifics re: lighting, detail, texture, composition, color and optics. Also provide personal thoughts re: Vermeer, these paintings and historical significance + influence.
- **2) Mozart Music Project**: Write a paper on an Assigned piece of Mozart's music. Provide: historical detail, cultural significance, contemporary usage, composition, tone, form and personal thoughts re: Mozart + his music.
- 3) 18th 19th Century (Architecture or Fashion) Project:

Create a visual presentation on either one of the Fashion styles or Architectural styles we covered from 1700 -1900. Expand on information covered and or focus on a detail within that style that is of interest to you. Provide Numerous visual supporting images.

- **4) Impressionist Artist Project**: Create a visual report on an Impressionist artist (assigned) Include overview of their artistic body of work and focus on two particular creations (compare + contrast). Provide personal thoughts on your artist, their work and historical significance + influence.
- **5)** 20th Century Film Paper: Write a personal report (not a review) of a 20th century film (as chosen from assigned list) that you have NOT seen. Include why this film is now considered important, your personal take on the film (give detail and cite examples) and commentary regarding acting, direction, cinematography, score, sound, art direction, costuming and visual effects (if applicable)
