COURSE DESCRIPTION

This interactive and immersive course teaches the basics of improv comedy through games and written exercises. Students will learn the improv "rules" and participate in interactive games and exercises — in groups and individually, performing and writing. While the emphasis will be on creating characters, improv is a fantastic way to gain confidence, practice collaboration and increase creative flexibility.

GOALS OF THE COURSE:

- Acquire knowledge of the history of improv and those that invented games and formats (i.e., Viola Spolin, Del Close)
- Learn the basic rules of improv and common improv games.
- Gain confidence working under a time limit or thinking on the fly.
- Create a tool-kit to utilize when writing, directing, acting or living.
- Strengthen the habits of listening to others and working in collaboration.
- Learn how to develop characters with distinctive voices and attitudes.
- Develop a good attitude toward "failure" and go outside a comfort zone.

CLASS EXPECTATIONS:

- Be ready and willing to try something new. Be willing to push yourself out of your comfort zone.
- Bring energy to class: show up physically and mentally.
- Come on time and stay for the entire class.
- Participate in all the performing and writing exercises.
- Be supportive of your fellow improvisors and yourself.
- Get out of your head.

ACADEMIC POLICIES AND PROCEDURES:

- Cell phones and computers should not be used during class, except for assigned writing purposes. A warning for the first offense will be followed by a lowering of a grade for the second offense.
- Using or imbibing mind-altering substances prior to class is not appropriate.
- Participation is mandatory. Fun is optional but recommended.

Internet Policy: Material discussed in the room is considered private and should not be posted anywhere on the internet or shared on social media.

Recording Devices: You may not record without the consent of the instructor.

Writing Division Attendance Policy: Students are allowed two absences throughout the semester. <u>CLASS</u>: Who/Where/Why Is Today So Important line, Two-Headed Expert, Emotional Orchestra, New Choice

<u>FOCUS</u>: Confident presentation. Avoiding self-judgement. Creating distinctive characters and voices.

<u>HOMEWORK</u>: Write down interesting snippets of dialogue you overhear: arguments, vocal tics, accents, attitudes

CLASS 4 - Mon, Sept 27

<u>CLASS</u>: Who/Where/Why Is Today So Important line, Very Big Store, Poet's Corner writing & performing exercise

<u>FOCUS</u>: Writing in a particular voice, listening to others, using "spacework" and physicality to improvise without words.

CLASS 5 - Mon, Oct 4

<u>CLASS</u>: Who/Where/Why Is Today So Important line, Blind Date, Catch-Phrase Character, Podcast

<u>FOCUS</u>: Subtext in dialogue. Listening. Finding character specifics.

CLASS 6 - Mon, Oct 11

<u>CLASS</u>: Who/Where/Why Is Today So Important line, One-Sided Playwright, Theater/Movie Styles

FOCUS: Listening. Mimicking tone and dialogue.

CLASS 7 - Mon, Oct 18

<u>CLASS</u>: Who/Where/What I Need line, writing prompt coming from conflict point in an existing scene, Everyday Olympics

<u>FOCUS</u>: Creating a specific environment, and using the environment to further character.

<u>HOMEWORK</u>: Bring a common (not valuable) object or two from home to use and share at next week's class (for example: spatula, trombone, plunger, Rolodex, yarmulke, cat toy). Items will be returned, undamaged.

CLASS 8 - Mon, Oct 25

<u>CLASS</u>: Who/Where/What I Need line, This Is A... (using the objects people found in their homes), New Choice, Emotional Scene

<u>FOCUS</u>: Thinking creatively/breaking the box. Getting in touch with your infinite creativity.

CLASS 9 - Mon, Nov 1

<u>CLASS</u>: Who/Where/What I Need line, five-minute scene planning exercise, Oscar Moment scene

<u>FOCUS</u>: Working with a clock ticking. Thinking about scenes in the bullet-points/overall arc.

CLASS: Who/Where/What I Need line, Daytime TV Talk Show, Anaconda

<u>FOCUS</u>: Mimicking a character someone else created and building on that. Serving the needs to the scene as a whole.

<u>CLASS</u>: Who/Where/What I Need line, Emotional Orchestra, Let's Make A Date, Gibberish

<u>FOCUS</u>: Collaboration, creating characters with physicality

<u>FOCUS</u>: Working with limitations, dialogue style as a means of building character

<u>CLASS</u>: Who/Where/What I Need line, I Want To See That scene, Tindr profile character (writing exercise) —> Dating Game

<u>FOCUS</u>: Building bigger stories from scenes, bringing characters from the page to the stage

<u>CLASS</u>: Potpourri (favorite games revisited)

<u>FOCUS</u>: Doing the thing you felt least comfortable doing in class 1. Setting new goals and intentions.
