Course Description

Introduction and development of techniques needed to transition from the script to score. Beginning with an exploration of Broadway's "Golden Age" and the examination of Sondheim and his contemporaries.

Learning Objectives

Students will gain an ability to confidently read and analyze a musical score. They will understand the interconnectedness of music and text, and explore ways to approach rehearsing and performing text into song.
