Course Description

Introduction to Auditing and Assurance Services will be discussed from the perspectives of management and other users of the financial statements and other reports, as well as, the external auditor and other assurance professionals.

Learning Objectives

- 1. Select and appraise the appropriate management assertions and evidence-gathering procedures to gather appropriate sufficient audit evidence for identified company transactions and accounts.
- **2.** Understand the concepts of sampling and analysis and apply them to gathering evidence using CAATs (Computer Assisted Audit Techniques).
- 3. Predict the various risks in an audit and explore identifying higher risk areas.
- **4.** Understand Professional Judgment and Professional Skepticism to develop conclusions on evidence gathered.
- **5.** Identify the steps necessary to complete and conclude on an audit through class examples and discussions.
