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Course Description

Design Essentials is a broad examination of design language, process, and context. It situates design as an integral part of the fabric of a multitude of professional disciplines and industries. The course provides students with (1) an overview of language to discuss and apply core visual principles and concepts within 2D, 3D, and interaction design; (2) an introduction to design-based problem solving techniques, including empathy, observation, problem definition, ideation, solution selection, prototyping, and evaluation; and (3) an investigation into overarching historical and contemporary contextual issues and opportunities within design and its related fields.

Learning Objectives and Outcomes

- Understand the basic language of visual concepts.
- Understand the techniques and methodologies of design including observation, problem definition, ideation, prototyping, and evaluation.
- Understand the overarching role of the designer in historical context.

Recommended Preparation: IDSN-510 Integrative Practices Residential recommended. No prior design knowledge is required or expected for this class. Those with extensive prior design education are encouraged to complete IDSN-530 "Technology Essentials" or IDSN-525 "Business Essentials" in lieu of this course.

Course Notes

This course will be conducted online, using a combination of synchronous and asynchronous methods.

Contact Hours

This 3-unit course requires 1125 minutes (18.75 hours) of instructional time per semester, which equals 75 minutes (1.25 hours) of instructional time each week. Instructional time may be further broken down into 37.5 minutes (0.625 hours) of asynchronous time and 37.5 minutes (0.625 hours) of synchronous time. In addition, it is expected that students will work, on average, an additional 150 minutes (2.5 hours) per week outside of class — on readings/viewings, homework assignments, field experiences, and individual or team projects. Synchronous class sessions will be offered as regularly scheduled evening or weekend classes, once each week.

Each of the group assignments is an exercise in distribution of tasks. This is a challenging endeavor, and will require you to be able to assess your strengths and weaknesses as well as evaluate your interests in the type of work you would like to contribute to the assignment.

All group members should be involved in the ideation for each project before getting started or distributing tasks. For each assignment, one person should take the lead when it comes to the “asset wrangling” and compilaon of material into a final document. It is the responsibility of each group to clarify the roles and contributions of each member for each assignment. This will be required for the final Self and Team Member Assessment.

Assignments

Assignment 1.1: SYMMETRIC COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5” x 11”.

Create a grayscale composition using only dots, lines, and shapes that is symmetrical along a single axis (reflecting side by side).

Assignment 1.2: ASYMMETRIC COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a grayscale composition using only dots, lines, and shapes that is asymmetrical (does not repeat or reflect itself on any axis).

Assignment 1.3: RADIAL COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a grayscale composition using only dots, lines, and shapes that is radially symmetrical (repeats like a kaleidoscope from the center of your composition using multiple axes).

Assignment 1.4: LINEAR COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a grayscale composition using only dots, lines, and shapes that uses linearity (uses repetition and orientation of visual elements to create the illusion of linear movement in the image).

Assignment 1.5: FREEFORM COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a grayscale composition using only dots, lines, and shapes. Make your composition non-figurative (do not try to make a representative illustration).

Assignment 2.1: COMPLEMENTARY PALETTE

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a composition using only dots, lines, and shapes that makes use of a complementary color palette.

Assignment 2.2: MONOCHROMATIC PALETTE

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a composition using only dots, lines, and shapes that makes use of a monochromatic color palette.

Assignment 2.3: NEUTRALIZED PALETTE

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a composition using only dots, lines, and shapes that makes use of a neutralized color palette. Pick two complementary colors and explore the range of neutral tones in between.

Assignment 2.4: WARM PALETTE

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a composition using only dots, lines, and shapes that makes use of a warm analogous color palette.

Assignment 2.5: COOL PALETTE

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a composition using only dots, lines, and shapes that makes use of a cool analogous color palette.

Assignment 3.1: GRID PATTERN COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create your own pattern using a repeating grid of your own choosing. You can use dots, lines, shapes, textures, and color.

Assignment 3.2: KALEIDOSCOPE COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create your own radial pattern using a polar coordinate grid. You can use dots, lines, shapes, textures, and color.

Assignment 3.3: GRADIENT COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a composition using dots, lines, shapes, textures, and color gradients. You can use dots, lines, shapes, textures, and color.

Assignment 3.4: MOIRE COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a black and white composition using only lines that take advantage of the moire optical effect.

Assignment 3.5: SUPREMATIST COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Replicating the style of Suprematist painters such as El Lissitzky and Kazimir Malevich, make a freeform composition using dots, lines, shapes, textures and color. Don't try to copy one of their paintings, but rather make an original composition in a similar style.

Assignment 4: ONE WORD COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a black and white composition using only dots, lines, shapes, and text. The composition must be based around the word "bicycle". Focus on typography and typesetting and not on illustration. Think about the theme; How does it make you feel? What does it remind you of? Use your knowledge of grids, alignment, symmetry, balance, and harmony to create an aesthetically pleasing poster.

Assignment 5.1: WIREFRAME POSTER

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: Layout all of your wireframes on one 8.5" x 11" artboard in Adobe Illustrator.

Create five (5) different variations on a poster structure using the wireframing technique. The poster must be for a fictional music event, so it must have the name of the performer, a date/time, a venue, and a city (all of which you can make up). These can be done using anything from Adobe Illustrator to pencil on paper. Annotate the areas where content will go, but don't apply any styles yet.

Assignment 5.2: POSTER DESIGN

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a poster for a fictional music event. The poster must include the name of the performer, a date/time, a venue, and a city (all of which you can make up). Any illustrations or photos included in the design must be created by you.

Assignment 6.1: ARTICLE SPREAD WIREFRAME

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: Layout all of your wireframes on one 8.5" x 11" artboard in Adobe Illustrator.

Create five (5) different variations on an article structure using the wireframing technique and the content supplied to you. The article must include a title, subtitle, author name, and body text. The article must fit across two 8.5" x 11" pages (17" x 11"). These can be done using anything from Adobe Illustrator to pencil on paper.

Assignment 6.2: POSTER DESIGN

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator or Adobe InDesign, and make your spread cross two 8.5" x 11" artboards.

Create an article spread using the content supplied to you. The design must include the title, subtitle, author name, and body text. Focus on the legibility of the content, the visual style that you choose to contextualize the article, and the details around the minutia in magazine design. Look towards your favorite magazines for inspiration in layout designs.

Assignment 7.1: FLOWCHART

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: Make your file 8.5" x 11".

Create a flowchart that shows the interconnectivity of the pages within your website. Your website must have at least five different pages. Consider what the needs of your website design might be and how users will navigate between pages. Be sure to keep your wireframing separate from your flowchart. This can be done using anything from Adobe Illustrator to pencil on paper.

Assignment 7.2: WIREFRAME WEB PAGES

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: Layout all of your wireframes on one 8.5" x 11" artboard in Adobe Illustrator

Following the structure of your flowchart, wireframe the visual structure for each page. Every page that is unique in your flowchart should have at least one wireframe sketch associated with it. You will need at least five (5) unique web page wireframes. These can be done using anything from Adobe Illustrator to pencil on paper.

Assignment 8: INFOGRAPHIC DESIGN (group)

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Working with your group, you will be creating an infographic poster to communicate information about the subject assigned to you. Use at least three different forms of graph or chart representations to convey your data in a visual manner. Explore different data visualization techniques from basic charts and graphs to innovative and unconventional types of representations. Tell a story or make an argument with your data.

Assignment 9.1: PAREIDOLIA IMAGE RESEARCH

Deliverable(s): Submit your photo through the LMS as a .jpg file.

Details: Provide a high enough resolution that we can see good details in the image.

Find at least one example of pareidolia you have encountered in your own life and take a photo of it to share with the class. Identify what you believe you see in the object.

Assignment 9.2: GESTALT COMPOSITION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Create a composition based around one of the core principles of gestalt psychology: emergence, reification, multistability, and invariance.

Assignment 9.3: SEMIOTIC TRANSFORMATION

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work and the original images through the LMS as both a .psd file and a .jpg file.

Details: Provide a high enough resolution that we can see good details in the image.

Find two images on the internet and combine them in Adobe Photoshop so that their juxtaposition changes the perception of the meaning for the viewer. What sort of iconography and messages does the photo communicate? How do your modifications change the message? How can recontextualizing and juxtaposing the imagery change the perception of the message by the viewer?

Assignment 10.1: LOGO DESIGN (group)

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: Layout all of your initial logo sketches on one 8.5" x 11" artboard in Adobe Illustrator.

Working with your group, create a logo design for the company that was assigned to you. Do background research into the company, what they do, and what sort of brand image they currently communicate. Start by doing 20 simple thumbnail sketches of logo icons from each of your group members using pencil on paper. Get together in your group and discuss which thumbnails are most effective and how you might be able to combine your concepts into the final logo version, which you should produce in Adobe Illustrator.

Assignment 10.2: STYLE GUIDE FOR BRAND (group)

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: The style guide should be a multi-page PDF that is 16:9 (1920 x 1080 pixels, made for widescreen digital displays) and is made in Adobe Illustrator.

Working with your group, create a style guide to manage the logo and brand usage for the company that was assigned to you. Consider the ways the logo should and shouldn't be used, the color specification, type specifications, margin and padding specifications, and any other brand-specific style considerations that should be taken when implementing visual designs related to your brand.

Assignment 11: PRINT ADVERTISEMENT DESIGN (group)

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator and make your composition 8.5" x 11".

Working with your group, create a print advertisement for the product assigned to you. Do background research into the company, what they do, and what sort of brand image they currently communicate. The advertisement should have a clear message and present a convincing argument for consuming the product.

Assignment 12.1: ART OF THE TITLE RESEARCH

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as a .pdf file.

Details: Just write up a paragraph about each title sequence you have selected.

Visit the Art of the Title website and select five (5) examples of title design that you find visually appealing. Write a short paragraph about each title you selected and the reasons why you think it was interesting to include.

Assignment 12.2: TITLE STORYBOARD (group)

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: You should use Adobe Illustrator with multiple artboards set to 1920x1080 pixels (16:9 aspect ratio).

Working with your group, create a storyboard outlining the redesign of the opening credits for an existing film. You must include credits for studio, stars, casting, costumes, music, editing, production design, director of photography, producers, executive producers, creators, title, writers, and director. Your storyboard should convey typesetting, background imagery, transitions, and the linear progression of content from start to end. Use a thumbnail storyboard style to layout multiple shots on a single page in order to make it clear how the transitions between shots occur.

Assignment 13: PRODUCT SECTION VIEW

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: Your four-panel layout should be on a 1920x1080 pixels (16:9 aspect ratio) artboard.

Create a four-panel section view of a new design you have created for a product type that will be assigned to you. You must include a top, front, side, and perspective view of the product. You can begin by drawing the different product design views on paper and then scanning them into the computer, but the final design should be done in Adobe Illustrator or a 3D software of your choice.

Assignment 14: SMART PRODUCT DESIGN (group)

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as both an .ai file and a .pdf file.

Details: The final outcome should be a 16:9 (1920 x 1080 pixel) PDF presentation of your product with accompanying illustrations, descriptions of functionality, and selling points.

Working with a group, you will be inventing a brand new product or reinventing an existing product to put a new spin on it. This product will be a physical object that you can embed with computing technology: sensing, actuating, logic processing and networked data access. Consider all of the potential areas you may be interested in working in before deciding on a specific one to focus on.

You should follow the steps outlined in the creative problem solving process in the development of your smart product. Take all of the design insights you have gained in the class so far and apply them to the creation of your smart product design presentation. The important thing to focus on is the interaction design considerations that go into the usage of the product. Consider the perspective of the user. How can

the additional functionality provided by embedded computing systems affect the outcome of using the product or the behavior of the user when engaging the product?

Assignment 15: SELF AND TEAM MEMBER ASSESSMENT

Deliverable(s): Submit your final work through the LMS as a .pdf file.

Details: Just write up a paragraph about each title sequence you have selected.

Put together a one page document outlining the contributions and level of effort that each of your team members applied to the group projects. Spend some time describing in detail the ideas your team members came up with, the designs they produced, the labor they put into the work, and their general engagement with your group meetings and discussions. This is an opportunity for you to demonstrate your awareness of your team members' contributions as well as report on any shortcomings that they may have had during the course of the group projects that were made during the class.
