#### **Course Description**

This class will provide you with a 'nuts and bolts' understanding of the legal issues affecting any new venture. You'll learn the basic rules of the road of contracts, liability, risks, and insurance available to protect yourself and your ventures.

#### **Learning Objectives and Outcomes**

Students will walk out of class with a basic understanding of legal concepts that apply to being an entrepreneur and their products and ventures. They will be able to self-assess their actions from the standpoint of liability in tort, contracts, uniform commercial code, contracts, etc., and gain an understanding of when/how to use disclaimers, waivers, insurance, etc., and when to hire a lawyer.

#### **Description and Assessment of Assignments**

**Reading:** Students will be expected to read approximately 25 pages per week in advance of class. Class lecture/discussion will focus on specific instances of what has been read and how the student may use that information in a business/entrepreneurial setting.

**Presentations:** Students will be assigned to individually present real/anticipated examples they have experienced personally or learned through research and how those examples may have been handled better/worse/differently then what actually occurred. Each student will present twice during the semester. Each presentation is worth 5 points. Depending upon the number of students, we will have 1-2 students who present at the beginning of class each week. Students will receive full credit (5 points each) for the presentation, unless they fail to present, or there is a major deficit in the presentation. Grades will appear on Blackboard.

**Quizzes:** There will be 4 multiple choice quizzes (closed book) taken outside of class on concepts learned in the readings and class discussions. These will be available on Blackboard and completed during the week after they are assigned. Each quiz will have 10 questions with 4 possible answers.

**Midterm/Final Exam:** There will be each a midterm and a final exam. The midterm and final are each worth 25 points. The midterm and final are open book, open note. They will be taken in week 8 and during the final exam period, respectively. The midterm and final will consist of short essay questions based upon the materials taught to that point. The final is not cumulative.

#### **Academy Attendance Policy**

In addition, being tardy to class will count as one-third of an absence. Three tardies will equal a full course absence.

Students remain responsible for any missed work from excused or unexcused absences. Immediately following an absence, students should contact the instructor to obtain missed assignments or lecture notes and to confirm new deadlines or due dates. Extensions or other accommodations are at the discretion of the instructor.

Automatically excused absences normally may not be used for quiz, exam or presentation days. Using an excused absence for a quiz, exam or presentation, such as in the case of sudden illness or other emergency, is at the discretion of the instructor.

In the case of prolonged illness, family emergencies, or other unforeseen serious issues, the student should contact the instructor to arrange for accommodation. Accommodation may also be made for essential professional or career-related events or opportunities. All accommodations remain at the discretion of the instructor, and appropriate documentation may be required.

#### Fall 2021 addendum:
