Course Description

Welcome to Camera & Improv! This course provides an introduction to the basics of being in front of the camera as well as behind the camera. You will learn the skills you need to create the world around yourself in the space of your audition. You will also be behind the camera and learn how to create story by writing filming and editing short films.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Apply basic concepts of creating an audition.
- 2. Develop a comfortable presence in front of the camera
- 3. Create your own film content from beginning to end

Prerequisite(s): THTR 220A or THTR 252A

Co-Requisite(s): N

Recommended Preparation: Get comfortable using a simple editing software like iMovie for Apple computers.

Course Notes

We will develop film and story telling content by just doing. A great deal of what we learn will be through trial and error experimenting in front of the camera as well as behind the camera. The more we practice the better we get.

Technological Proficiency and Hardware/Software Required

Students will be asked to use their phones to film their content and have sufficient space on a hard drive. We will be editing on a basic software like iMovie. Please have a computer or iPad available and ready to work on.

Editing project. Students will gather footage and pictures of themselves and edit a one minute and a half story with narration.

Action sequence. Students will write an action sequence of one to two minutes long. They will shoot, edit and add music. The students have the choice to be in front or behind the camera, or both, for this project.

2 Page scene. Students will write a two page scene. They will then shoot the project and edit it into a final piece. Students have the choice to be in front or behind the camera, or both, for this project.
