Course Description and Overview

The course is designed to help the actor demystify on camera acting and be self-sufficient at self taping auditions. Through a series of on camera games and exercises acting students will deepen their understanding and relationship with the camera.

Course Objectives

Students will conduct on camera exercises and have the opportunity to focus on individual and group projects, which will be shared with the class as a whole at the end of each session. The students will regularly create original content and deliverables throughout the course that will strengthen their relationship and understanding of acting on camera.
