AMST 630: Interdisciplinary Research Seminar: African American Studies Black Study Fall 2023

The goal of this research seminar for PhD students is to encourage deep thinking about the stakes, the limitations, and the potential of interdisciplinary research in Black Studies in the Arts and Humanities. Together, we will read challenging theoretical texts in Black Studies. In the spirit of what Fred Moten and Stefano Harney call "Black Study," throughout the semester, students will workshop their own writing and research with the goal of producing a 15–20-page essay at the end of the seminar that might serve as the basis for a longer project.
