SYLLABUS:

QBIO 493: Quantitative Biology Honors Seminar, Fall 2023

This course is a required course for students majoring in Quantitative Biology (http://qbio.usc.edu) with Honors distinction.

Introduction: The Quantitative and Computational Biology Section offers a Quantitative Biology (QBIO) major. This major allows biology students to achieve a broad background in the quantitative sciences such as computer science and statistics that are essential for modern data driven biological science.

Course Objectives: The goal of this honors seminar is to stimulate your interest in biological research and to develop your ability to communicate scientific ideas effectively. QBIO 493 includes a particular focus on quantitative analysis of biological data.

Expectations: One primary means for achieving the course goals is to get involved in academic research in the field of quantitative biology. Students enrolled in QBIO 493 are expected to do research in a lab of their choice approved by the instructors. Students are expected to give feedback to their peers on their presentations.

Course Requirements: Each QBIO 493 student is required to give presentations during the semester. This includes: (i) a presentation on a recent paper using computational biology methodology; (ii) presentation of their own research. A schedule for presentations will be generated early in the semester.

Grading: Course grades will be based both on presentations and class participation as follows:

Students are expected to ask questions and exchange ideas freely. Each student should be prepared to ask at least one question by the end of each presentation.
