Course Outlines: This is an undergraduate research seminar course. The purpose of this course is to expose undergraduate students to research in stage early. The seminars will be given by the faculty in Chemistry department. CHEM294 will get you more involved in the undergraduate research programs.

The class consists of seminars and lectures. Faculty research will be presented by seminars. Each lecture will be given before a seminar to cover a couple of important foundations related to the seminar. There will be six seminars in total during the 2023 Fall semester.

Course Materials: No textbook.

Grade: You will be graded equally on two course components: Seminar reports (80 %) and seminar attendance (20 %).

After the seminar, you need to write a report, ca. ~ 1 page, by summarizing the contents of the seminars. The report should include descriptions of 1) the aim of the presented research projects, 2) Methods (Theory and Experiment), 3) Results and 4) Conclusion. The students should submit a report for each seminar. The deadline will be ~ 1 week after the seminar and the submission information will be posted in Blackboard. The report should be submitted via Blackboard or email to susumuta@usc.edu.

Late report will get the deduction of points (submission in less than one week after the deadline = 66 % of maximum points, submission in \leq two weeks = 33 % of maximum points and submission in > two weeks = no point).

You should attend both seminars/lectures and ask questions. Ask **four questions** at least during this semester (there will be six seminars and six lectures). The questions will be counted as your attendance.

You will need to attend all seminars and complete their reports to receive "A".
