Class Overview

CTPR 484 is a large intensive group production class where the practical application for producing a multi-camera television comedy Pilot is experienced. The class will prep, shoot, post and deliver a 30 minute comedy Pilot which is shot in front of a live studio audience. Students and faculty work together addressing the myriad aesthetic, technical, collaborative and ethical issues integral to making a comedy pilot. The Pilot idea is pitched, chosen and developed into a first draft prior to the start of the fall semester in collaboration with CTWR 487 writing students. Multiple crew positions and skills ranging from Producing, Directing Team, Cinematography, Editing, Production Design, and Sound are taught in breakouts by Professors who are professionals in those fields.

CTPR 484 provides a unique opportunity at SCA to learn about and create Comedy Television with a large production crew and staff.
