Course Description

This class will explore the art of theatrical clowning and how it supports all live performance. We will investigate what it means to be on stage in performance and give the student a solid understanding of what it takes to make people laugh. We will discover what makes each individual student funny in their own singular, inimitable way, and come away celebrating our greatest failures with the same enthusiasm as we do our most triumphant triumphs. Underneath all of it is the truth. Comedy isn't comedy unless it is rooted in a deep understanding and experience of the human condition. Through this exploration, we begin to see the similarities between comedy and tragedy, the pathetic and the sublime, the sacred and the profane.

This class will challenge students to fully give in to the present moment, to redirect their focus to the relationship between performer and audience, to examine the threshold of what can be done with our bodies and voices in performance, to confront preconceptions about one's own individual capabilities and discover what makes each individual funny, to celebrate one's greatest failures and experience the magnitude of true openness in front of an audience.

Learning Objectives

- To create original comedic material based on our in-class clown work
- To constructively critique the work of other classmates as well as professional work
- To apply the criticism from the class and from myself to the student's classwork
- To develop one's own sense of what makes them funny.

Required Readings and Supplementary Materials

For required reading and viewing please see breakdown of class schedule. All viewing and reading should be carried out **PRIOR** to the class for which is it indicated.

Description and Assessment of Assignments

Clown Piece – an original piece of material, with or without text, generated from the class work around clown technique and pathos. We will utilize the concepts of "separations" and "bafflement." The piece will be presented in at least two rounds, the second round having been adjusted, augmented based on the feedback from the class.

Final Culmination – a remounting of work done throughout the semester...

Each assignment will receive a grade out of 100.

AI Policy

I expect you to use AI (e.g., ChatGPT and image generation tools) in this class. Learning to use AI is an emerging skill, and I welcome the opportunity to utilize it in your clas work in a way that supports your growth and education. Keep in mind the following:

- Al tools are permitted to help you brainstorm topics or revise work you have already written.
- If you provide minimum-effort prompts, you will get low-quality results. You will need to refine your prompts to get good outcomes. This will take work.
- Proceed with caution when using AI tools and do not assume the information provided is accurate or trustworthy If it gives you a number or fact, assume it is incorrect unless you either know the correct answer or can verify its accuracy with another source. You will be responsible for any errors or omissions provided by the tool. It works best for topics you understand.
- Al is a tool, but one that you need to acknowledge using. Please include a paragraph at the end of
 any assignment that uses Al explaining how (and why) you used Al and indicate/specify the
 prompts you used to obtain the results what prompts you used to get the results. Failure to do so
 is a violation of academic integrity policies.
- Be thoughtful about when AI is useful. Consider its appropriateness for each assignment or circumstance. The use of AI tools requires attribution. You are expected to clearly attribute any material generated by the tool used.]

Additional Policies
