Course Description

Evolution is the unifying principle of all biology, but the importance of its study is not restricted to biologists. Understanding evolution is of paramount importance to comprehending the "why" and "how" of the natural world (including us). This course provides students from all disciplines with an understanding of evolution as both a pattern and a process. The course will help prepare students to think critically about a wide range of everyday issues including environmental and human health, and the origin of human society.

Learning Objectives

At the end of the course, you will be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of the origins of hereditary variations.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the relationships among processes of change and time.
- Demonstrate knowledge of processes of microevolution, mutation, genetic drift, and natural selection.
- Demonstrate knowledge of processes that influence diversity in molecular, anatomical, and behavioral characteristics of organisms.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the relationship between population genetics and evolution.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the concept of speciation and of the factors that may contribute to the development of new species.
- Demonstrate knowledge of macroevolution and of the major factors affecting it.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the origin and development of early life on Earth.
- Demonstrate knowledge of hominid evolution.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the history of evolutionary thinking and the evidence for evolution.

Laboratory Description

Students will meet weekly (unless otherwise noted) in their designated laboratory sections. Labs are dedicated times for students to critically evaluate different aspects of evolution through an inquiry-based approach.

The last two lab classes of the semester will be devoted to student presentations on topics of the students' choice related to evolution and aimed at a general (non-academic) audience. Detailed instructions and guidelines, including deadlines for topic submission will be posted to Blackboard.

Exams:	The lecture portion of this course will include one midterm examination and a final examination. All examinations (midterms and final) may include multiple choice questions, fill in the blanks, matching, definitions, short answers, and quantitative problems. The final exam is non-cumulative.
Laboratory:	Your laboratory score will be assessed within your respective laboratory section. Attendance to laboratory sessions is mandatory except for in the case of emergency or extreme circumstances. An acceptable written excuse for missing a lab must be proactively provided to your lab instructor.
Grading:	Your final grade in the course will be determined using the breakdown shown in Table 1 below. Grades will be updated continuously throughout the term as assessments are completed.

<u>Policy on Re-grading Exams</u> – If you feel that an error was made in the grading of an exam, please use the following steps: 1) Double check the posted answer key and think critically about the responses provided, 2) Prepare a **written statement** explaining why you feel your grade was incorrect which includes references of lecture material. Submit the request along with your original exam to your professor within one week of the time the exam was returned to you. The entire exam will be subject to a re-grade and, as a result, your grade may increase or decrease from a requested re-grade.

<u>Policy on Missed Exams</u> – Exam dates are firm and there are <u>no make-up exams given in this</u> <u>course</u>. You may be excused from the midterm exam in the event of a documented illness, emergency, or other extreme circumstance beyond your control. No other excuses for missing exams will be accepted.
