This course assesses African expressive cultures and/as systems of thought that offer critical insight on topics such as ethics, aesthetics, metaphysics and epistemology, history, technology, ecology etc. We will consider the entangled development of Africa's anti-colonial struggles and literary movements in the 20th and 21st centuries. These include Négritude, "Third World Feminisms," Pan-Africanism, Ecocriticism, as well as LGBTQIA+ politics. The aim is to ascertain how formal aesthetic and political revolutions diagnose the condition of coloniality and imperialism and *plot* various modes of resisting or overturning these conditions. In addition to philosophical texts, the reading material will range from novels, plays, and visual cultural objects (film, painting, photography etc.).
