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Catalogue Description

We will introduce some information theoretical methods to prove communication complexity lower bounds and streaming lower bounds.

Course Description

Communication complexity is a computational model which captures communication cost between several parties to jointly compute a function. There are several players in the model with each having their own input. The goal to compute a joint function based on the inputs, while minimizing communication bits. Besides communication complexity itself, lower bounds in this model also capture many other computational models such as time-space tradeoffs for data structures, streaming algorithms, sketching algorithms, sub-linear time algorithms, and many more. This course will introduce several techniques to prove communication lower bounds as well as their applications to streaming lower bounds.

Learning Objectives

The course is designed to enable students to:

- Understand communication complexity models, including deterministic communication, nondeterministic communication, and randomized communication.
- 2. Understand several lower bound techniques such as rank method, discrepancy, information complexity and lifting theorems.
- 3. How to apply communication complexity lower bounds to streaming lower bounds.

Knowledge at the level of CSCI 170 and MATH 407
