Course Description

Advanced Theatrical Drafting is a beginners/intermediate level course for students learning to use computer aided design and drafting (CAD). Students will deepen their understanding of drafting language and learn the fundamentals of AutoCAD. Through a series of exercises students will learn how to effectively communicate their designs with technical drawings. The final project, due at the end of the semester, will be a full package of drawings that students can include in their portfolio. The course utilizes weekly assignments and tutorials; some assignments will be reviewed in class for open critique. Emphasis will be placed on understanding drafting language, control of the drafting software, problem solving and self-motivation.

Assignments

Weekly assignments must be completed fully and on-time to guarantee success in the learning experience and in the course. Students will be given instructions on how to submit their work in a specific format for each assignment.

Grading Criteria

In all projects, students will be required to understand and demonstrate the fundamentals of representational media (drafting graphics) in visual communication. The assignments will also require fundamental notions of handcrafting and AutoCAD drafting. Work will be evaluated periodically so that students have an indication of progress. Unsatisfactory performance warnings will be issued to students whose work does not meet the minimum requirements. University guidelines on plagiarism pertain to drafting work. Students are expected to do all of their own presentation work. Substantial assistance in the form of drawing preparation, or deliberate appropriation of the work of others will be considered non-original work and will be treated as plagiarism. Attendance

This course is strongly based on class attendance and week to week progress. It is essential and required for all students to be on time and present for all classes and tutorials.
