Course Description

From the 2022 SXSW Grand Jury + Audience Award winning filmmaker and actor behind the Patton Oswalt film I LOVE MY DAD, James Morosini (SDA Alum) -- Over the course of this semester class, each student will be writing, directing, and starring in their own short film. The class will aim to help students discover their own unique voice while helping to provide the tools necessary to begin creating one's own material. By learning how to create your own unique stories, you will never be in a position where you as an actor or creative are waiting for the phone to ring. Each week we will focus on a different part of the process, from ideation, to writing, to rewriting, to producing, to directing, to marketing, and every step in between. Some classes we'll be using as case studies to focus on successful writer/director/actor driven material and James will be inviting various guest lecturers behind this work to come in and speak and work with students. The goal of the semester will be walking away with at least one finished piece that represents your voice as a multi-hyphenate creative.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify and define the structure within a screenplay.
- · Write, direct, and produce their own short film
- Create and develop a portfolio of writings along with consistent writing habits.
- Evaluate and critique work written by your fellow writers.

Description and Assessment of Assignments

Grading Scale (Example)

"Excellent" indicates that the student couples clear understanding of the class material with original and creative insight. "Good" means that the student demonstrates a clear understanding of the material. "Average" indicates that the student demonstrates a general understanding of the material but with some gaps. "Poor" indicates that there are identifiable gaps in the student's understanding of the material. "Failure" is the result of the student not having completed his or her assignments coupled with poor understanding of the material. Course final grades will be determined using the following scale:

Excellent: A (4) = 100-94; A- (3.7) = 93-90

Good: B+ (3.3) = 89-86; B (3) = 85-84; B- (2.7) = 83-80 **Average:** C+ (2.3) = 79-76; C (2) = 75-74; C- (1.7) = 73-70 **Poor:** the D range (.7-1.7) = 60s; F (0) = 59 and below
