#### Course Description

This course is designed for International Teaching Assistants to help them improve communication skills particularly as they relate to TA duties. The course introduces students to a variety of communication and teaching styles guiding them to explore their own and improve overall comprehensibility. Emphasis is given to developing linguistic accuracy and fluency. Course content assignments offer students ample practice for the development and reinforcement of communication skills fostering an appreciation of multi-cultural learning environments.

#### Learning Objectives

In this course, students will develop an awareness of the importance of pronunciation and how it affects oral discourse. They will develop a working knowledge of different aspects of pronunciation such as vowel and consonant phonemes, prominence, intonation, thought groups and pitch variations. Students will improve their ability to analyze and discuss course content, develop short engaging lessons and brief tutorials, use academic vocabulary effectively to express and explain concepts in their field, and engage in controlled discussions practicing their use of academic and colloquial language.

#### Course Notes

Upon completion of this course, students will receive a grade of Credit (CR) or No Credit (NC).

#### Required Readings and Supplementary Materials

Select materials will be distributed in class and available on Brightspace.

#### Description and Assessment of Assignments

**Self-Introduction (Diagnostic):** Students will prepare a 3-min self-introduction using details, images, and interesting facts about themselves and any aspects of their background they want to share with the class. The use of photographs is highly encouraged. There will be a brief Q & A at the end of the self-introduction. The purpose for this initial assignment is to create community in the class. It will also be used as an initial diagnostic by the instructor.

**Storytelling (Individual Task):** Students will prepare a 3-5 min story to share with the class on a selected theme; see instructions and assignment requirements on Brightspace.

**Mock Interviews (Group Project):** Students will prepare for and conduct in-class mock interviews. They will alternate in their roles as Interviewers and Interviewees and will carry out interviews inquiring about the duties, experiences, and challenges in the career or educational context of choice. Students will be evaluated on overall communication effectiveness, linguistic accuracy and fluency, and engaging storytelling skills. Interviews will be recorded for self-, peer-, and teacher feedback.

**Formal Interview & Presentation (Individual Project):** Students will plan and conduct a formal 20-30 min oral interview of a Professor or experienced TA in their department or field of study. Alternatively, a professional in a field of choice can be selected (approved by instructor). Interview will be recorded for analysis. Be prepared to share with instructor the recording upon request. Students will also design an in-class presentation that will include selected clips of the interview accompanied by an oral summary and commentary of highlights and main points discussed. This project should demonstrate improvement in overall communication and presentation skills, pronunciation, and linguistic accuracy.

**Battle of the ITAs (Final Individual Project):** Students will design and present a 7-minute interactive speech which demonstrates their ability to construct and deliver a speech with fluency and linguistic accuracy, integrating effective storytelling techniques and interactive elements that build rapport with the audience. Speech will be followed by a Q & A session. Presenters will be evaluated on presentation style, delivery, and oral discourse. Presentations will be recorded for self, peer, and teacher feedback. This project should demonstrate significant improvement in overall communication and presentation skills, pronunciation, and linguistic accuracy from the beginning of the semester.

## Participation & Class Discussions Evaluation Rubric

Students will participate in formal and informal class discussions covering selected topics.

Each session will be customized to fit specific class needs and will build on what was covered in previous sessions. Similarly to how graduate students are expected to contribute to class discussions and TAs are expected to be effective and interactive speakers, you will be required to contribute to all classroom activities, including critiquing classmates' presentations on effectiveness and language use. Students learn from analyzing each other's oral performance and exchanging of ideas. Therefore, come ready to interact and engage in class discussions every session. Students will be evaluated on preparation, argumentation, fluency, and comprehensibility.

**The "uSC" Program:** The "uSC" (Undergraduate Student Consultant) Program offers our ITAs a great opportunity to practice English with a native speaker outside the classroom. You will be assigned a uSC with whom you will meet outside of class (two hours per week, starting week 4) for a total of 20 hours. This is a requirement and a chance for you to work on teaching skills, fluency, slang, pronunciation, conversation, or any other areas you wish to improve.

## **AI Generators Class Policy**

### **Permitted ONLY for select task preparation**

Since creating, analytical, and critical thinking skills are part of the learning outcomes of this course, all assignments should be prepared by the student working individually or in groups. Students may not have another person or entity complete any substantive portion of the assignment. Developing strong competencies in these areas will prepare you for a competitive workplace. Therefore, using AI-generated tools is only allowed to help you brainstorm ideas or prepare for class discussions. However, you are to refrain from reading from any AI-generated notes during class discussions or presentations; the aim of your class participation is to use your own language for improved communication.

**Use of AI to prepare for assignments:** Be thoughtful about when AI is useful. Consider its appropriateness for each assignment or circumstance. The use of AI tools requires attribution. You are expected to clearly attribute any material generated by the tool used.

**Lesson Planning and Delivery:** Plagiarism includes the submission of lesson scripts generated by AI; you may use AI to help brainstorm ideas or prepare an outline, but the lesson design and delivery should be your own work.

**Group work:** Unless specifically designated as a 'group project,' all assignments are expected to be completed individually.

## **Course Content Distribution and Synchronous Session Recordings Policies**
