Course Description

CHEM 515 is a graduate level course in Inorganic Chemistry. The intent of this course is to give you a comprehensive picture of structure and bonding in Inorganic Chemistry. The course will begin with a brief review of symmetry and group theoretical analysis. From there, we will develop a detailed picture of structure and bonding of discrete inorganic molecules using molecular orbital theory. Towards the end of the course, we will take these tools and extend them to an examination of structure and bonding in clusters and extended solids.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to apply a working knowledge of molecular orbital theory to describe the structure and bonding of inorganic complexes. They will be able to assign point groups to molecules and clusters and use symmetry to formulate qualitative molecular orbital diagrams to predict structure and reactivity. Students will be able to use concepts of molecular orbital theory to develop electronic band diagrams for extended solids and predict metallic vs. insulating behavior.

Recommended Preparation: It is strongly recommended that students have successfully completed an upper-division undergraduate course in Inorganic Chemistry prior to enrolling in CHEM 515.
