Course Description

This course is intended to be a review of algebra, including but not limited to: real numbers, linear equations and inequalities, functions, graphs, systems of equations, exponents, polynomials, rational expressions, radicals, quadratic equations and solutions. Optional topics: Complex numbers, exponential and logarithmic functions.

Learning Objectives

This course should help develop the mathematical skills necessary to prepare students for MATH 108g (Contemporary Precalculus), MATH 114xg (Foundations of Statistics), and MATH 117g (Introduction to Mathematics for Business and Economics)
