Course Description

Arabic 1 is an introductory course aimed at teaching elementary Arabic to students who have no prior, or very limited, knowledge of either spoken or written Arabic. Our time in class will center active, communicative, and experiential learning. There will be very little lecturing. **The bulk of class time will be spent using Arabic**, whether through conversation, practicing completing tasks in Arabic like making purchases, asking for directions, ordering food, etc., listening exercises, or grammar drills. For this reason, it is absolutely essential that you participate actively in every class.

Course Materials

All students must purchase the following required textbooks:

- Alif Baa, An Introduction to Arabic Letters and Sounds (Third Edition) by Brustad, Al-Batal & Al Tonsi.
- Al-Kitaab fii Taʻallum al ʻArabiyya, Part 1 (Third Edition) by Brustad, Al-Batal & Al-Tonsi
- In addition to purchasing both textbooks, students must enroll in the companion websites for both textbooks. Instructions on how to do so will be sent by email.

Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of Arabic I, 80% of students will be able to:

- Use all skills to successfully communicate about the following themes:
 - Self, immediate and extended family
 - Weather
 - Daily activities and hobbies
- Speaking:
 - Exchange familiar cultural greetings and expressions
 - Produce short sentences and phrases to talk about course topics, ask and respond to familiar questions, and express likes and dislikes
 - Describe events in present using regular forms
 - Discuss self, family, work and studies
- Writing:
 - Form short paragraph-length texts using simple language on familiar topics.
 - Write short emails and fill in forms
- Reading:
 - Identify basic information and summarize main points in simple passages on familiar topics
 - Use information from a text to complete various tasks (e.g., ordering from a menu)
- Listening:
 - Recognize familiar words, phrases and structures and identify basic information in level-appropriate audio/visual texts about personal topics
- Accuracy:
 - Recognize and accurately use the following grammatical features:
 - Nominal and verbal sentences
 - Question forms
 - Three types of plural forms
 - Numbers
 - Agreement and negation
 - Idafa and adjective structures

Assessment + Evaluation

• Participation: 10%

The bulk of class time will be spent using Arabic, whether through conversation practice, grammar drills, or task-based exercises. Because class is where you will receive most of your speaking and listening practice, coming to class prepared and ready to participate is essential to your success in this course.

In order to receive full participation credit each day, you will need to:

- 1-Arrive to class on time and remain for the entire class
- 2-Arrive with your assignments completed
- 3-Actively participate in class activities (in Arabic!) and demonstrate improvement in your speaking and listening skills

• Homework + Homework Corrections: 25%

Each homework assignment is due at the beginning of class. Regular completion of homework is essential to your success in this class.

Your homework does not need to be error-free to receive full credit. Your homework will be assessed on completion, improvement, mastery of old material, and evidence of effort toward mastery of new material.

Late homework assignments will not receive credit except in exceptional circumstances.

I will offer you the opportunity to correct some of your homework assignments throughout the semester. Instead of correcting these assignments myself, I will comment on them using a correction code that I will provide to you. Use this correction code as a guide to correct your homework **in a different color ink.** If you aren't sure how to correct your homework or need clarification, you are more than welcome to seek help from me in office hours.

• Recorded Assignments: 5%

Students will complete two recorded assignments (2.5% each). See due dates in the schedule below. Each recording will respond to a prompt that I will post in advance and will require you to use a range of vocabulary and grammar. Be creative and have fun with these assignments!

Exams: 30%

Students will take three exams over the course of the quarter, worth 10% of your final grade each. See dates on the schedule below.

Oral Exam: 5%

You will receive detailed instructions and a rubric for your oral exams later in the course. Oral exams will take place in class on Thursday, December 5.

• Final Exam: 25%

The final exam will be cumulative.

• Extra Credit

Up to 10% extra credit on the final exam can be earned through participation in the Center for Languages and Cultures' Language Exchange Program. Students should interview their language partner and submit a recording of the interview to the instructor. Students may also interview an Arabic speaking student who is not a part of the Language Exchange Program. Students must complete three interviews of at least five minutes each to receive the full extra credit (interviews can be with the same person).
