Course Description

Medical Doctors provide only a part of contemporary health care. This course focuses on opportunities in the health care field beyond the role played by the physicians, providing information to those that are interested in health care but who may be unsure of options they have and the requirements to fulfill those options

To gain knowledge regarding healthcare professions beyond the role played by the physician

Description and Assessment of Assignments:

Question submissions and participation

Question submission—you will receive credit/points for the questions as well as submission in a timely manner (must be submitted by Sunday unless otherwise indicated). Questions should be derived from the speaker's bio, which will be sent the week before (not a general question). Participation requires attendance in class as well as asking one question of the speaker.

There will be no recording of speaker presentations.

Weekly Papers

One-page summaries after each speaker discussing what the student has learned from the presentation—the student will receive credit/points for each summary.

Final Paper

3-5 page paper summarizing all speakers as well as knowledge gained regarding healthcare professions and how the class may have influenced the student's career choices.

Additional Policies

Course Policy on Make-up Exams
