Course Objective:

Introduction to formal elements of the screenplay through lectures and the workshopping of a complete first draft of a feature-length script. Students will learn the steps to "build" a script from idea (spine, beat sheet, treatment, draft), culminating in the the completion of a feature script.

Course Description:

Let's write a script. Yup, it's intimidating. Yup, it's a great deal of work. Yup, it can drive you bonkers. That's screenwriting! Over the next semester, we'll learn how you can go from an idea for a film to a completed draft of a script. Or, as I like to put it, how 16 weeks to puke out a script. Trust me, it'll be fun. Ish.

Students may not have another person or entity complete any substantive portion of the assignment. Developing strong competencies in these areas will prepare you for a competitive workplace. Therefore, using Al-generated tools is prohibited in this course, will be identified as plagiarism, and will be reported to the Office of Academic Integrity.
