Catalogue Course Description

Software and digital tools for traffic analysis, highway and railway design, transportation demand, and public transportation planning

Expanded Course Description

The course covers a comprehensive exploration of the transportation landscape, empowering you to leverage cutting-edge software tools such as PTV Vissim, PTV Visum, OpenRoads, and OpenRails. Students learn to perform in-depth traffic analysis, highway and railway design, transportation demand and public transportation planning. They also explore the latest advancements and gain practical expertise in shaping the future of transportation systems and infrastructure.

Learning Objectives and Outcomes

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- Learn highway alignments and model corridors in OpenRoads software.
- Design railway corridors in OpenRails software
- Build and analyze signalized intersections in Vissim software.
- Develop transportation network and analyze travel demand data in Visum software.

Prerequisite(s): None Co-Requisite(s): None Concurrent Enrollment: None

Recommended Preparation: Previous coursework in transportation is not required, but exposure to an introductory transportation at the level of CE 471 would be beneficial.

Required Textbook

This course does not require a textbook. All necessary materials will be provided through open educational resources (OER) and the instructor's handouts available online.

Description and Assessment of Assignments

The following components are used to assess the outcomes:

<u>Homework Assignments(25%)</u>: At the end of each topic, homework assignments will be available; they are due one week from the assignment date, unless otherwise indicated. There are a total of 7 homework assignments. Students are expected to complete all homework assignments on time. Late assignments are accepted with a 20% penalty only for up to 24 hours after the due date; a submission after 24 hours will receive no credit. Homework assignments must be submitted electronically. If there is any evidence of cheating, relevant University policies and regulations will be applied. Homework assignments will be graded based on organization, neatness, accuracy, and effort.

<u>Class Assignments (25%)</u>: Class activities are evaluated using class assignments, which will be assigned during the last 30 minutes of class every 2-3 weeksand are due by end of the class. Time is allotted during these class periods to discuss and solve the class assignment questions. Late assignments are accepted with a 20% penalty only for up to 24 hours after the due date; a submission after 24 hours will receive no credit. Grades will be based on the involvement in these class activities and the quality of the solutions.

Exam I (25%): There will be one in-lab open-book exam held during our regularly scheduled class time in Week 7. In case exam I is missed, an official, acceptable, and verified excuse must be presented to be able to make up the exam as early as possible. This excuse must be recorded within 24 hours. An unexcused failure to take the exam will result in a in a zero for the exam.

Final Exam (25%): There will be one in-lab open-book exam held on the Final Exam week. The exam is not cumulative, though the nature of the material is. There will be absolutely no exceptions to the final exam's date and time, so plan accordingly. The date and time for the final exam are dictated by the University (see https://classes.usc.edu/).
