COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Review of Algebra. Real numbers, linear equations and inequalities, functions, graphs, systems of equations, exponents, polynomials, factoring, rational expressions, radicals, quadratic equations and solutions, with emphasis on word problems.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Develop the mathematical skills necessary to prepare students for MATH 108g (Contemporary Precalculus), MATH 114xg (Foundations of Statistics), and MATH 117g (Introduction to Mathematics for Business and Economics).

GRADING SCALE:

This course is CR/NC (credit or no credit). Students will receive a CR if they accumulate at least 1000 points.

GRADING SYSTEM:

Over the course of the semester, you will complete assignments to earn *points*. Your *score* will be the cumulative sum total of your earned points. Once you earn points, you cannot lose them. The total available points are as follows:

ASSIGNMENTS:

- Homework will be assigned after each lecture via Gradescope, due 8am before the following lecture. Collaboration is allowed, but your final submission must be your own work.
- Worksheets will be completed in discussion each Thursday as detailed in the course schedule. Collaboration is highly encouraged, though each student will submit their own worksheet.
- Midterms will be in-person exams worth 200 points as detailed in the course schedule. Each midterm will have a *retake* also worth 200 points during the following week respectively, and will contain *similar* problems that cover the same course topics. For each course topic, the highest score between the midterm and the retake will be counted, for a total possible 200 points on each midterm and retake pair. That is, Midterm 1 + Retake 1 is worth 200 points and Midterm 2 + Retake 2 is worth 200 points.
- Extra Credit opportunities will be offered on sporadic lectures, consisting of a single problem concerning that lecture's material. Extra credit will be submitted with corresponding homework and will be clearly indicated in the assignment.
- **Final** will consist of an in-person exam on *Friday, May 9th from 8:00-10:00am* worth 300 points plus a review project worth 100 points, to be submitted at the start of the exam period.

COURSE POLICIES:

- You are a person first and a student second. If you have any extenuating circumstances interfering with your coursework, it is your responsibility to communicate those to me, and we can attempt to work through them.
- With the points grading stucture, there will be no late homework submissions or makeup worksheets. Note it is possible to pass the course completing only 25% of either homework or worksheets.
- No calculators will be allowed on any in-person exams.
- All course material will be available on Brightspace, including lecture notes, assignments, and solutions.
- Gradescope will be the location for all graded assignments. Homework must be submitted to Gradescope by the deadline, and you must assign your solutions to their corresponding problems. Failure to assign a solution to its corresponding question will result in a score of 0 for that problem. Note that the deadline timer stops when you upload your file; you have as much time as you need to assign solutions to questions.
