#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course provides an introduction to Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) from a neurodevelopmental & neurodiversity perspective, with a focus on lived experience and occupational participation. Students will be provided with an overview of current perspectives on etiology and interventions, as well as a comprehensive overview of the strengths and challenges of autistic individuals. There will be a focus on the occupational participation of autistic individuals along the developmental trajectory, including engagement in family life, education, leisure, employment and advocacy. Students will engage in reflective activities about representations of ASD in the media, film and TV, and group discussions about health disparities, autistic self-advocacy, neurodiversity and other contemporary perspectives on disability. Whenever possible, guest speakers with autistic lived experience or clinical/research experts on the topic will join the class.

#### **COURSE HIGHLIGHTS!**

- Reflect on the differences between the pathology and neurodiversity paradigms, and how these inform our understanding of ASD as a society.
- Learn from autistic individuals and experts in autism research and clinical care.
- Critically appraise media, interventions/services, and policies that portray or serve autistic individuals.
