Course Description

This course is a comprehensive introduction to the field of psychological science, including historical and contemporary approaches. Topics covered include psychological research design and methodology, biological bases of behavior, sensation and perception, learning and memory, critical thinking and decision-making, human development, social bases of behavior, personality theories, and psychological disorders and their treatment.

*This course fulfills a requirement of the General Education (GE) program in effect for students who began college Fall, 2015, or thereafter. It does not count toward the GE program that remains in place for students who began before Fall, 2015. Please check with your academic advisor about your GE requirements.

Learning Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- *Define and describe* a variety of vocabulary and fundamental concepts in psychological science.
- *Understand, interpret, and critically analyze* research findings related to concepts in psychology.
- *Examine* ethical principles and considerations in psychological research and practice.
- *Evaluate* the impact of psychological concepts on students' personal lives.
- *Produce* an APA-style research paper.

You will have a total of 4 exams in this course. Each exam will consist of 60 multiple choice questions. You will have 70 minutes to complete it (with the exception of the final – see below). InQuizitive Assignments

InQuizitive is an adaptive quizzing tool which is designed to help you learn by testing yourself and using errors as growth opportunities. The questions are based on your textbook material, and serve as a helpful study tool for exams. You will complete a series of questions, earn points for correct answers and lose points for incorrect answers. However, this activity allows you to wager points depending on your confidence level, so you can earn points faster by correctly answering questions with a higher wager. You must reach a minimum target score to earn 100% and complete the activity. Be careful, because you can also lose more points by incorrectly answering a question with a higher wager. You will need to complete more questions if you get more wrong to reach the target score.

You may complete the questions in as many sittings as you want. That is, if you complete five questions one day, and go back two days later, your answers for those five questions will still be there. Your grade is based on correctness and not effort or participation. Your lowest InQuizitive grade will be dropped. InQuizitive assignments are due by the dates listed on your Course Schedule below. You must access InQuizitive assignments through your Brightspace links for credit to be assigned to this class.

Note: You are responsible for verifying that your Brightspace gradebook accurately reflects your progress on the InQuizitives. When you are working on the InQuizitive assignments look for the green box that says "Connected to LMS" to make sure you are correctly linked to Brightspace. Progress should be reflected immediately in your Brightspace gradebook. If you find that there is no grade showing for an InQuizitive assignment after you have completed it (or made significant progress in it), you must notify me (via email) before the deadline so that I can manually assign you credit. If you wait until after the deadline to notify me, you will receive a 0 for these assignments (even if you did the work). If you only see credit in your Norton account, but not Brightspace, it was NOT successfully linked.

APA Research Paper

To understand the research process and psychology as a science, you will complete a research paper that adheres to the standards in the Publication Manual of the American

Psychological Association (7th edition). You will be given the skills, tools, and time to work on the paper during your lab sessions. Detailed information about the paper is available on Brightspace. The paper will be turned in to your LECTURE SECTION of Brightspace and is due on **April 18th** by 11:59pm. Please make sure your APA paper is submitted as a PDF document. **Again, you are responsible for checking that the document you submit is readable AND is the document you intended to submit!**

Participate in Research Studies (or Alternates)

Part of understanding psychological science includes participating in studies; thus, you are required to participate in research studies conducted in the psychology department. You can view and sign up for studies through the SONA system at https://usc.sonasystems.com/. You are required to complete 5 points of credit on SONA. Two of your points must be completed by participating in lab studies (i.e., in-person) and not survey research (i.e., online), unless no in-person studies are available for you to participate in due to the study's requirements. Although most students fulfill the research requirement as study participations, you may complete the requirement by completing one of two alternatives: volunteering for the Joint Education Project (JEP; the psychology placement only) or three alternative essays (2 pages each). You may complete a combination of participating in studies and completing essays; this is typically done when there are not enough studies on SONA for people to sign up. Information about the alternative assignments is available **upon student request** and must be manually assigned in Brightspace. Please note that the grading for alternative assignments is based on quality and not just completion. The alternative assignments will be turned in on the LECTURE SECTION of Brightspace. Participation in all studies and completion of alternative assignments must be completed by May 1st. Alternative assignments are due by 11:59pm and will not be accepted late.

NOTE: This course is NOT graded on a curve. Final grades are rounded up to the nearest 0.1% (e.g., 92.86% to 92.9%) but not to the nearest full percentage (e.g., a 92.86% will NOT be rounded up to a 93%). Please do not ask for an exception. **Grades will not be altered or raised based on student request, and extra credit is not an option. Your lowest InQuizitive grade will be dropped, instead.**

Assignment Submission Policy, Grading Timeline, and Other Notes

Assignments are to be submitted on Brightspace (or completed through accessing links on Brightspace) as outlined in this syllabus.

Make-Up Policy:

- Lab assignments and the APA Research Paper may be turned in late, in accordance with the late policy (see item #2). **InQuizitive assignments may not be completed late, but the lowest score will be dropped.** No exceptions!
- Exams may only be made up due to an emergency or illness and must be completed within one week of the exam date. There will be a 10% deduction applied to exams taken late to due to illness.
- The Final Exam cannot be taken early. Please schedule any plans around the date of the Final Exam. No exceptions because this is university policy.

Late Assignments:

• Assignments turned in late will receive a 5% reduction each day for the first two days they are turned in late. For the following five days (i.e., after the first two days) the late assignment will result in a 10% reduction for each day it is late. After seven days, an assignment cannot be turned in and will result in a grade of zero. No exceptions!

• Your best bet at remembering and understanding the material is to complete the required readings BEFORE class. Also, keep in mind that you may need to do multiple readings of the textbook and distribute your studying over many days (possibly weeks) to properly prepare for the exams.

Support Systems

Students and Disability Accommodations:

USC welcomes students with disabilities into all of the University's educational programs. <u>The Office of Student Accessibility Services</u> (OSAS) is responsible for the determination of appropriate accommodations for students who encounter disability-related barriers.
